## Report on the Trip to Wales

---

Joanne Penn and Marcia Wise on behalf of the American/British exchange

This year's American Exchange to Wales and England took place from July 22 to August 12. The young Friends who went were Luke Arendasky, Jon Napolitano, Caroline Beerley, Meredith Baumgartner, Kelsey Schwartzenbach, Rachel Wise, Gail Whiffen and Sarah Quinn. Marcia Wise and Joanne Penn served as chaperones.

Everyone on this year's trip had a wonderful experience. There were many ways that our British friends carefully planned activities and cultivated the environment in order to provide optimum opportunities for community and learning about each other. Trust came naturally as these opportunities accumulated. Whatever we did it was fun, it went smoothly, and we felt as one.

The organization of the trip on the British side was well thought out, well coordinated. They had many people to provide the housing, meals, transportation and background information on the places we went.

Our first week was spent on Anglesey, an island in the north of Wales. We were housed together for five days where our community bonded, and took day trips to prehistoric sites, Caernarfon and Beaumaris castles.

During the second week we spent three days in London, staying overnight at a Youth Hostel. We saw the British Museum, Buckingham Palace, took a boat ride from Westminster Pier to Tower Bridge, went into Old Bailey (to see the Elizabeth Fry statue), rode on the London Eye, and much more.

The third week we spent in "1652 country" learning about the start of Quakerism. This was a very interesting four-day trip in the Lancaster, Kendal and Li\Ulverston areas of England. We stayed together at beautiful and quaint Rookhow Meeting where we also did a day of community service building a path in the woods for wheelchairs.

We also spent a day at Elton Towers, England's premier theme park, and a day in Liverpool; (yes, we went to the Beatles Story Museum.) Our days off were placed in the right places for reorganizing ourselves and resting.

Two things that were a constant during the trip were Epilogue and Meeting for Worship. The Epilogues started on Anglesey. Each evening we would have dinner, the assigned group would clean up, the rest would go out and play "4 square," then we'd all go to the beach and play games, come back

and have tea, and then have Epilogue.

Epilogue is sort of a planned meeting for worship. Each night a group took it upon themselves to lead it. We would go into the "Epilogue Room" and sit or lie in a circle. Candles would be lit, and we'd wait in silence. The sharing came in the form of silence, the playing of selected CD music, poetry or speaking. It lasted for half an hour. It became a time that everyone looked forward to when we were together. We also were able to do this in the evenings at the youth hostel in London, and while we were in 1652 country.

The other constant was our Meetings for Worship. Whereas Epilogues were in the evenings, we tended to do Meetings for Worship in the mornings, when we were leaving places like Anglesey, Rookhow Meeting, the Tonge's barn, and the airport. We also had four wonderful "official" Meetings for Worship at Bangor Meeting, Chester Meeting and Rookhow Meeting.

At Bangor we could hear the sea gulls overhead throughout the entire Meeting for Worship. The Clerk welcomed us, our group sang their "introduction" song, Joanne said what we had been doing, Marcia read the Traveling Minute, and then everyone reintroduced themselves. A wonderful lunch was waiting for us afterward and all were so very happy to see us.

Our Gwynedd youth had the happy satisfaction of looking in Bangor's guest book and seeing the names of their brothers and sisters and friends who previously had been part of the American/Welsh/English exchange. It was a profound moment for them to see in writing that they themselves were tracing the very steps made three, six, nine years ago by others from our Meeting.

At Chester Meeting we were there for two Sundays, so we attended two Meetings for Worship. By then we had already met so many of the Chester Friends that it felt very familiar to be there. Both times the American and British young people stayed the first half hour, and spent the second half hour with a prearranged person who spoke with them. After that they again joined our group in the Meeting room and we introduced ourselves, read the minute and sang the introduction song.

Cheron Turner (who with her husband Roger, chaperoned their trip to us in 1998) is the Clerk of Chester Meeting. She read a history of this exchange

## **Seventh Month**

Marty Wilcockson announced that the caring circle lists have been updated and revised and will be posted on the bulletin board.

Craig Trueblood reported on his leading to attend Eastern School of Christian Ministry to obtain a certificate of Christian Leadership.

The Clerk read a traveling minute, which was approved by the meeting, to be sent with the eight young friends and two adults who will be leaving this week for their trip to Wales.

Karen Russell gave the quarterly report. She expressed concern that the upcoming quarter has the most expenses and is traditionally the month with the fewest contributions. She noted that the expenses for the Hilltop property upkeep this year of \$19,754 also include capital improvements. She is holding invoices for property taxes of \$17,600 for the past and current year until Neil Trueblood is able to clarify how much in taxes are owed given our status as a religious organization. The balance in the Hilltop Fund is \$23,377 of which \$8,000 is the security deposit on the house which will need to be returned to the renters when they leave.

Henry Beck presented a recommendation from Stewardship and Overseers committees for the meeting to hire an office manager. The bookkeeping function as grown enormously and requires more time than we can reasonably expect from the meeting Treasurer. The position will be 20 hours a week, with daily presence at the meetinghouse. Many of the

functions Sandy Snyder has been doing as Meeting Secretary will be handled by this person. Henry said the additional cost to the meeting would be approximately \$7,000. The Stewardship Committee proposed that the hiring process begin in eighth month for a position to begin in 10th month. The meeting expressed appreciation for the hours Karen Russell has donated to the meeting over the past years. Appreciation was also expressed to Sandy Snyder for all the work she has done as Meeting Secretary.

Connie Lezenby reported the Hilltop Discernment Subcommittee is recommending a meeting retreat be held at Burlington conference center January 4 and 5 for fun, fellowship and worship. It will also be a time to consider prayerfully Gwynedd's leading for the use of the Hilltop property.

Deep appreciation was expressed to Constance Lezenby for her service as Clerk of our meeting....her guidance, care and leadership.

### ***Eighth Month***

Letters requesting membership were read from Roger Buchanan, Jean Kuebler and Gary Lapreziosa. Clearness committees were named.

Marcia Wise and Joanne Penn reported on the Youth Exchange trip to Wales. See full report on page 7.

Neil Trueblood asked for suggestions on how to deal with the weeds in the playground. Members have expressed concern about the use of pesticides in areas where children play.

The meeting approved proceeding with the process of recruiting an office manager. The person will report to someone on Overseers and the new Treasurer.

Pegene McPhaden, for Religious Education, asked the meeting to consider some type of memorial meeting on the anniversary of 9/11. A member expressed a desire for the meetinghouse to be open that day. There will be an interfaith service at 4th and Arch that evening. See *NOTES from FRIENDS*.

Neil Trueblood reported that the renters of Hilltop will be leaving the end of August and we will be looking for a new tenant. The exterior of the house is being painted and should be completed this month. The barn has been rented for \$450 a month. The Board of Assessment is aware that our application for tax relief is coming and are prepared to review it.

Henry Beck announced that the Gathering Garden has taken a sabbatical year this year. However, group spiritual direction on Friday evenings will continue for a small fee. Also a small group of Friends meets the first Sunday of every month at 8:00 for group spiritual direction. There is no fee for the Sunday sessions.

Stephen Bevan is appointed to receive the contributions of friends of Radnor meeting...Caddwalader Evan Gwynedd...& to bring an account thereof to ye next meeting.

**1802:** Joseph Roberts laid down a paper condemning his Deviation in accomplishing his Marriage with a Woman not in the Membership with Friends by the assistance of an Hireling minister and without the consent of his parent for which he expresses sorrow. Thomas Evans & Elias Cleaver are appointed to visit him & report to next meeting.

**1902:** Your committee appointed to have charge of the entertainment of Friends of Abington Quarterly Meeting held at Gwynedd 8th mo 7th, 1902 reports that luncheon was served to those in attendance, numbering about four hundred in the SchoolHouse and in a tent which was purchased for that purpose. The horses were fed in the sheds.

**1952:** From Friends World Conference meeting Oxford England July 28 - August 5, 1952: War leads to a vicious cycle of hatred, oppression, subversive movements, false propaganda, rearmament and new wars.... We call upon peoples everywhere to break this vicious circle, to behave as nations with the same decency as they would behave as men and brothers, to substitute the institutions of peace for the institution of war.

### Stephen G. Cary, a Leading Quaker, Dies

---

*Excerpts from the obituary of Stephen G. Cary that appeared in the New York Times on August 3. The headline:*

Stephen G. Cary, who ran public-service work camps filled with fellow conscientious objectors during World War II and later became the leader of the American Friends Service Committee, died on Tuesday. . . . He also spent 13 years as acting resident at Haverford College. . . .

Mr. Cary's activities during World War II were featured in a documentary that was shown this year on public television. The film, "The Good War and Those Who Refused to Fight it," described how the government allowed about 12,000 members of pacifist churches...to perform national service in civilian work camps rather than be drafted into the military. Mr. Cary headed two of those camps. . . .

When the war was over, he went to Europe to work in the relief effort. From 1946 to 1948, he was chief of American Quaker relief operations in Europe, overseeing work in 10 countries. For these

efforts the Quakers were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1947.

On his return to the United States, Mr. Cary worked in various administrative posts at the AFSC national office. Over the years, he was a member of Quaker good-will teams that visited the Soviet Union and Vietnam. He was also active in the civil rights movement, and went to jail for 15 days in 1968 for civil disobedience at a Washington demonstration of the Poor People's Campaign.

Stephen Cary was born to a Quaker family in Philadelphia in 1915. He never forgot, he once said, that his father abruptly quit a good job when the company he worked for accepted a military contract. . . .

In the documentary this year, Mr. Cary reflected on the destiny of his central ideals.

**"I have no illusions that my pacifist views are going to prevail, none at all," he said. "But every great change in expanding the dimensions of human freedom has come from very small original beginnings; somebody said no."**
